Obituary

REVEREND JAMES WYNETOTTE SMITH, JR., affectionately called "J.W.," the first born of the late Reverend Dr. and Mrs. James W. Smith, Sr., was born May 8, 1924 in Knoxville, Tennessee. God gave him deeply religious parents and because of this he came into this world destined to serve God and mankind. At an early age, he was deeply concerned about his religious life and joined Davie Street United Presbyterian Church, Raleigh, North Carolina. He then became a member of Seventh Street Presbyterian Church, now First United Presbyterian Church, and later became a minister as was his father before him.

J.W. received his primary education from the Raleigh Public Schools, B.A. and B.D. Degrees from Johnson C. Smith University, and a Master of Divinity Degree from McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago, Illinois. At McCormick, J.W. studied under the most renowned theologians of our time. He often reflected on his studies there and following God's expections, he took his educational experiences, his father's guidance and his active participation in the Civil Rights movement in North Carolina and began his career as a devoted minister.

He started by pastoring and helping to build Ben Salem United Presbyterian Church; pastored Caldwell United Presbyterian Church (now North Mecklenburg Presbyterian Church), Huntersville, North Carolina; pastored and helped to build the new sanctuary at Covenant United Presbyterian Church, Durham, North Carolina and was called on to serve as a Guest Minister in churches throughout North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Maryland and Washington, D.C. In addition, he served as a member and chairman of various professional organizations and committees.

He later moved to Washington, D.C. with his devoted wife of 41 years, the former Marjorie Caldwell, who wholeheartedly supported him in all of his endeavors. While in Washington, D.C., J.W. continued along his religious destiny where he became a Chaplain and later a Senior Chaplain of the Veterans Administration Medical Center, working 25 years in a unique manner serving God's Veterans who needed hope and compassion. J.W. was that "called one." For J.W., the hospital became his haven of ministry. He was sought not only by veterans but also by his fellow co-workers for his wisdom, knowledge and humanitarianism. Before retiring in May of 1990, J.W. received in reward for his accomplishments at the Veteran's Hospital, the renaming of the Afro-American Award to the Rev. James W. Smith, Jr. Award.

This is the most recent addition to his many, many achievements which include Chairman of EEO and Black History Committee at V.A. Medical Center; Past President and Vice President of National Capital Area Chapter of the Military Chaplains Association; Chairman of Chaplain Service at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Washington, D.C.; Member of Presbyterian Chaplains Council Committee on Selection of Chaplains for V.A. and Military; Financial Secretary, Military Chaplains Association; Member of Synod's Committee on Church Union and Christian Education; Chairman of Stewardship Interpretation Committee of Catawba Synod; Counselor, Southeastern Area, Fifty Million Dollar Fund; Moderator, Catawba Presbytery and Catawba Synod; Financial Clerk and Moderator, Yadkin Presbytery; Director, Westminister Foundation, N.C. Central University, Durham, North Carolina; Member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity; and Commissioner to the General Assembly of Presbyterian Church.
